853 Acres Protected by New Conservation Bank

First in Santa Barbara County



The Land Trust for Santa Barbara County has recently helped to permanently protect 853 acres in the Purisima Hills near Lompoc that are critical habitat for the threatened California Tiger Salamander (Ambystoma californiense).

Through an innovative public/private partnership, known as a "conservation bank", the first of its kind in Santa Barbara County, the Land Trust will hold a conservation easement on the property known as the Rancho La Purisima. A private company, the Conservation Land Group will in turn sell mitigation credits.

The Land Trust received formal approval for the project from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife and the US Fish and Wildlife Service, a requirement for establishing the conservation bank.

How does the conservation bank work?

A conservation bank presents an option for local developers, agencies, utilities, and energy producers who propose projects that will have a negative impact on the habitat areas of protected species such as the California Tiger Salamander. The US Fish and Wildlife Service requires those negative impacts to be mitigated in some way. The purchase of credits from the conservation bank is one way to meet that requirement. The number of credits mandated by the regulatory agency is determined on a project by project basis, and the price of the credits is determined exclusively by the market dynamics of supply and demand.

A WIN-WIN APPROACH TO CONSERVATION.

Conservation banks provide an incentive for owners of high-value properties with "critical habitat" to reap a financial reward from their land

and protect it at the same time. Income from the conservation bank can off-set the potential profits a landowner forfeits when they give up their development rights through a conservation easement. With an easement in place to protect the land in perpetuity, the La Purisima Conservation Bank turns a regulatory constraint into a financial opportunity and an ecological advantage. The conservation value is far greater when concentrating the protected habitat in a large, ecologically intact area rather than in a patchwork of small, unconnected mitigation plots.

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN ALL THE CREDITS ARE PURCHASED?

Once all of the conservation bank's credits are sold (we estimate that may take 5-10 years) the conservation bank simply ceases to exist, but the underlying easement that protects the habitat lives on forever. Like the Land Trust's other properties and projects, we will continue to own and monitor the La Purisima easement in perpetuity.

Conservation banking is an important tool that can benefit Santa Barbara County by securing important critical habitat for a local species facing the prospect of extinction. We are grateful to each of our partners that



were involved in establishing this complex bank; The Conservation Land Group, Debra Geiler, the US Fish and Wildlife Service, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, and Rancho Purisima, LLC.

* "Critical habitat" is a habitat area essential to the conservation of a listed species. It is a specific term and designation within the U.S. Endangered Species Act.



Scott Van der Kar served on our Advisory Board before recently joining as a Trustee. Scott's farming experience began at the age of five years when, in 1959, his parents bought a small avocado orchard in the Carpinteria Valley. The original orchard was more of a hobby than a business, but it was the beginning of what is now known as Pinehill Ranch.

As the Van Der Kar family's interest in farming grew, so did the size of the farm, reaching its present size of about 300 acres, with 150 acres under cultivation. Later participation in a grassroots organization named Preserve Rural Carpinteria was a catalyst for further community involvement, working for better urban/rural relations, eventually leading to service on the Land Trust for Santa Barbara County Advisory Board.

TIGER SALAMANDER MANAGEMENT

FROM WATER TO LAND ON LA PURISIMA

To prepare for the Land Trust's on-going management responsibilities on the new La Purisima Conservation Bank property, our Conservation Manager, Bruce Reitherman, attended a workshop in Monterey County at the Elkhorn Slough in early June presented by renowned California Tiger Salamander (CTS) expert Pete Trenham. Resource managers from all over California gathered around salamander breeding ponds located on the scenic Dorrance Ranch, a property protected by the Big Sur Land Trust overlooking the Salinas Valley. Here is an excerpt of his report on the workshop:

A number of CTS were captured, observed and returned to their breeding ponds during the afternoon session. The one pictured is a larval phase in a late stage of development, on its way toward becoming a "metamorph" ready to walk out onto dry land in search of a squirrel or gopher burrow in which to spend the long hot summer. While this

tadpole's form clearly shows adaptations for the aquatic environment (external gills for breathing and a tail that is strongly flattened to aid in propulsion) where it has spent the last several months developing from an egg, it also shows the well-developed legs that will continue to grow and become more robust over the next few weeks as the gills and tail "fins" are reabsorbed and disappear.

This excerpt describes just one of many miraculous transformations that salamanders and other amphibians undergo during the course of a life that moves from water to land and back again. Detailed understanding of the remarkable life histories of these ancient creatures will inform prudent management of the La Purisima Conservation Bank, a responsibility entrusted to the Land Trust in perpetuity.

LEGISLATIVE NEWS

FEDERAL INCENTIVE FOR VOLUNTARY CONSERVATION

Since 2006, when California ranchers or rural landowners voluntarily agreed to protect their land from development, the federal government gave them a deduction on their income taxes to recognize the charitable gift they were making. A survey by the national Land Trust Alliance showed that the incentive helped America's 1,700 land trusts increase the pace of conservation by a third – to over a million acres a year.

Unfortunately, this tax benefit that helped "land rich, cash poor" working farmers and rural landowners expired on Dec. 31, 2013. However, new federal legislation is pending in the House (H.R. 2807) that would renew this important land protection tool, encouraging more farmers and rural landowners to voluntarily conserve their land and receive a direct economic benefit. A bipartisan group of more than 212 Members of Congress have co-sponsored the bill. PROPOSED 2014 CALIFORNIA WATER BOND

A bipartisan, multi-billion dollar Water Bond Measure (SB848) is currently moving its way through the California Legislature. It includes significant funds for environmental projects that protect water sources and water quality, including funds for wetland restoration and acquisition of watershed lands. The deadline for placing the new measure on the November 2014 ballot is at the end of June and as we go to press with our newsletter, the bill was due for a vote by the full Senate. NEXT GENERATION OF CONSERVATIONISTS

Over the past 30 years, the Land Trust has completed 46 land deals, protected nearly 24,000 acres, spearheaded hundreds of acres of successful restoration projects, and sponsored on-going programs to educate both children and adults about the importance of protecting ranch, farm and open space land for future generations.

As our organization has matured, so have our membership base and our board leadership. In order to fulfill our mission in the years ahead, the Land Trust has launched our NextGen Program so that ultimately land conservation becomes an multi-generational stewardship effort. We hope to involve younger members of the community whose interests will become the driving force of the land conservation movement.

WHO ARE THE MEMBERS OF THE NEXT GENERATION OF CONSERVATIONISTS?

NextGenners are a younger demographic composed of professionals, entrepreneurs, non-profit organizers, students, families, government officials, land stewards, land owners, nature lovers, farmers, ranchers... Basically, they are people across all professions and disciplines with one thing in common; they care about the health of the land and its conservation and they are willing to do something about it.

WHAT DOES IT TAKE TO INVOLVE THE NEXT GENERATION OF CONSERVATIONISTS?

If you are a NextGenner it is the Land Trust's goal to learn about your interests, discover ways to work together, and empower you to become leaders of land conservation so that we may continue to create a legacy of permanently protected natural lands.

FIRST STEPS: Since the launch of the Next Generation Program in February, the Land Trust has actively engaged with people, organizations, and initiatives with innovative ideas and cutting-edge work, such as the following:

Fostering farms - food at our fingertips

We have teamed up with the Santa Barbara Permaculture Network, the Food Bank of Santa Barbara County, and the Santa Barbara Food Alliance - and potentially several others - to support a local food system, expanding the concept of a Food Hub. This project may house a farmer incubator system with the potential for an animal husbandry program, a processing facility, and a community kitchen. Eventually, we envision a farmer's market, a farm-to-table restaurant, a bread maker, a wine maker, and a cheese maker - all working together to provide food for our community!

Community partnerships

We continue to support and promote the work of **SproutUp**, an organization that connects college student-instructors with children to communicate vital concepts in environmental science and sustainability during the earliest stages of their educational development, cultivating the next generation of passionate caretakers of the earth. We have partnered with **Cultivate Events** (CE), an effort to promote the local food movement by re-connecting people to their food. The Land Trust supports this effort wholeheartedly as we reach out to event participants and create more opportunities for Land Trust supporters to experience CE's food adventures and farm and music festivals that celebrate small farmers, ranchers, fishermen, and food and beverage artisans. We have begun coordinating with the **City of Goleta** in their efforts to educate and lead tours through the **Coronado Butterfly Preserve**. With a few of our easement holders - the **Center for Urban Agriculture at Fairview Gardens, Midlands School** in Santa Ynez, and **Hibbits Family Ranch** in Lompoc - we have offered several events to provide the community with opportunities to learn about and become more intimate with the land you help us protect.

Internships

To help with the development of the NextGen Program, we are offering 6-month internships. Our first two interns, Niki Beigi and Sean Harwood, are recent UCSB graduates who assist with outreach, event planning, presentations and administrative work. A few of their contributions include:

- Surveying you, our community members, to discover what's important to you
- Inviting you to visit our properties and to learn something new, like 'History of Hot Springs Canyon', a hike led by local historian, Hattie Beresford
- Providing a smile, a warm welcome, and information for you at the trailheads of Franklin Trail, Hot Springs, and the Coronado Butterfly Preserve
